County commissioners vote to look for new lobbying firm

At its Oct. 21 meeting, the Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners voted unanimously to search for a new lobbying firm to represent the board's interests, choosing not to extend its agreement with Tallahassee-based Ballard Partners.

Commissioners say decision was driven by Ballard's failure to send a representative to the meeting or appear via Zoom, which irked Commissioner Shawn Wood.

"I'm not giving \$90,000 to someone that didn't show up," said Wood. "I make a motion that we look for another [lobbying firm]."

Wood's motion was quickly seconded without discussion and unanimously adopted by the

The board first hired Ballard in November 2022. With the current contract expiring on Nov. 14, 2025, the board had the option to extend the contract for another year at a rate of \$7,500 per month.

Per the agreement, Ballard

was responsible for advocating Gadsden County's interests at the federal level by securing funding, monitoring legislation, arranging meetings with decision-makers, and advising on policy strategies.

According to Open Secrets, Washington D.C.-based nonprofit that tracks money in politics, Ballard currently has 272 clients worth a total amount of \$33,930,000. The firm did not respond to a request for comment.

In Other Business

- The board begrudgingly

approved a measure that brings the county into compliance with Florida Senate Bill 784, which expedites development approvals and streamlines the platting and replatting process by shifting approval authority from elected governing bodies to designated administrative officials within local governments. The board designated the interim county administrator as Gadsden County's official responsible, but several members noted they only did so because it was the opinion of the interim county attorney that they were required

to appoint somebody.

- The board added \$594,428 to the sheriff's law enforcement budget for 2025-2026 to cover employee raises, IT software, and more vehicles.

- Interim County Administrator Reginald James announced the first phase of his county vehicle reduction plan is underway, which involves selling high-end vehicles like Ford Expeditions and Chevy Tahoes back to Enterprise.

The Supreme Court's decision will have a big impact on the Florida lawsuit.

After the U.S. Supreme Court this week said it will hear a case focused on the same federal law, a judge Thursday put on hold a long-running lawsuit about whether Florida medicalmarijuana patients can be barred from having guns.

Chief U.S. District Judge Allen Winsor issued a stay of the Florida lawsuit until after the Supreme Court decides whether a law prohibiting drug users having guns violates the Second Amendment. The Supreme Court on Monday announced it will take up a Texas case, known as United States

on the law.

In a motion seeking the stay of the Florida case, U.S. Department of Justice attorneys wrote that the Supreme decision the Hemani case will "almost certainly have a significant impact" on the Florida lawsuit

"The court (Winsor) should stay this case because the Supreme Court is currently hearing a case concerning constitutionality of the same statutory provision at issue in this case," the Justice Department attorneys wrote.

The Florida lawsuit, filed in 2022, is rooted in a conflict between federal and state laws. Under federal law, possession of marijuana is illegal; under a 2016 Florida constitutional

v. Hemani, that focuses amendment, hundreds of thousands of patients are able to buy medical marijuana.

> The federal law at issue bars possession of firearms by a person who is an "unlawful user of or addicted to any controlled substance." The Florida and Texas cases center on whether that prohibition violates the Second Amendment.

> "In this (Florida) case, plaintiffs allege that they either use or wish to use marijuana pursuant Florida's medical marijuana laws," said the Justice Department's motion for a stay, which was filed Thursday. "Plaintiffs also allegedly wish to possess firearms while being regular of marijuana, users prohibited but are from doing so by (the federal law). Plaintiffs seek a declaration

that (the federal law) and its implementing regulations violate the Second Amendment applied to their conduct and injunction preventing the government from enforcing (the federal law) and implementing its regulations against plaintiffs."

The Texas case does not involve medicalmarijuana patients — it stems from the discovery of a gun and drugs during an FBI raid of the home of Ali Danial Hemani as part of a criminal investigation. Hemani was charged under the law prohibiting drug users from having guns. In a document filed at the U.S. Supreme the federal Court, government said the prosecution involved Hemani's "habitual use

of marijuana."

But the 5th U.S. Circuit Court Appeals ruled in favor of Hemani's arguments that the federal law was unconstitutional as it applied in his case. The **Justice** Department then asked the Supreme Court to take up the issue. While the Supreme Court announced Monday it will hear the case, it is unclear when a ruling will come.

The Florida lawsuit was filed by thenstate Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried and medicalmarijuana patients. The lawsuit said the federal prohibitions "forbid Floridians from possessing or purchasing a firearm on the sole basis that they are statemedical law-abiding marijuana patients."

Winsor

the case in November 2022, spurring the plaintiffs to go to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Agriculture Commissioner Wilton Simpson, who elected in 2022 succeed Fried, dropped out of the case, but it has continued with the patients as plaintiffs.

A panel of the appeals court this year overturned Winsor's dismissal of the case, saying the federal government "failed to meet its burden ... to establish that disarming medical marijuana users is consistent with this nation's history and tradition of firearm regulation."

The ruling sent the case back to Winsor for further consideration.

Legislators look at 'tweaks' to growth law

State legislators are discussing the possibility of revising a new law that has drawn legal challenges because it blocks cities and counties from approving "more restrictive burdensome" changes to growth plans.

Senate Majority Leader Jim Boyd, R-Bradenton, said Monday during Manatee County delegation legislative meeting that he has talked with sponsors of the 2025 legislation and that "tweaks" are being discussed.

"I know I could speak for them because I talked them individually, Boyd, who is slated become Senate president after the 2026 elections, said during the delegation meeting in Bradenton. "We said all along, if there's things we can tweak and we need to fix, we certainly will."

Tom Sen. Leek, R-Ormond Beach, made similar comments Monday during a St. Johns County delegation

meeting in St. Augustine. "I can't tell you what those changes are going to look like, finally, because, like I said, it's a collaborative process negotiated between the two chambers (the House and Senate)," Leek said. "But there will be some changes to that bill, I fully expect. At least that's what I'm pushing for."

The limit on changes to growth plans was included in a wide ranging bill (SB 180) that Gov. Ron DeSantis signed on June 26.

Numerous cities and counties and the growthmanagement group 1000 Friends of Florida have filed two lawsuits in Leon County circuit court challenging the constitutionality of the part of the law dealing with growth plans.

The City of Ocoee has also filed a case at the state Division Administrative Hearings after the Florida Department of Commerce rejected the revised city's comprehensive plan because of the law.

delegation During meetings across the state in advance of the 2026 legislative session, residents and local officials have criticized the part of the law that has essentially frozen local land-development regulations and comprehensive through Oct. 1, 2027. That part of the law also was made retroactive to Aug. 1, 2024.

"Right now, in Manatee County, our board of commissioners cannot do what we the people elected them to do. Why? Because of the vague language contained in SB 180. It's an easy fix," Wright, Kevin representing the Manatee County Republican Liberty Caucus, told the Manatee County delegation.

The overall bill included a series of measures aimed at helping the state recover from three hurricanes that made landfall in 2025. For example, it required local governments each year to set in advance at least one debris-management site; to develop plans for businesses and homeowners about post-storm permitting processes; to establish what are known as mutual-aid agreements to bring in help from elsewhere; and to set plans for staffing after storms. Local governments also will be prohibited from increasing buildingpermit and inspection fees for 180 days after emergencies are declared for hurricanes or tropical

DeSantis has defended signing the bill, saying the "the core issue" for him was to ensure people whose homes damaged by hurricanes could rebuild without government interference.

"If you have damage to your home and you go to rebuild it and to restore it to what it looked like the day before that storm hit, you should be permitted to do it," DeSantis said Sept. 3 during an appearance in Valrico. "The government cannot prevent you from doing that. And these local governments were not allowing that. They were being difficult. So we got a lot of complaints about

that." Manatee County Commission Chairman George Kruse, whose county is part of one of the lawsuits filed in Leon County, expressed support for amending the law.

"We do not want to see Senate Bill 180 go away. It's a great bill," Kruse told lawmakers Monday. "We just want it tweaked so that the intent is actually implemented by the agencies. We have three branches of government, and your branch of

government, I believe, passed a good, albeit unclear bill. We just need to make sure it's clarified so that other branches of the government are acting upon it to allow municipalities to have the home rule necessary proper growth management."

The disputed part of the law applies to governments that were placed under federal disaster declarations from any of the three 2025 hurricanes. All 67 of Florida's counties were listed in at least one of the three declarations.

Sen. Gaetz, R-Niceville, and Rep. Shane Abbott, R-DeFuniak Springs, have filed identical bills (SB 218 and HB 217) for the 2026 session that would carve out certain counties from the freeze on changing growth plans.

"This (new) bill ensures that counties not affected by Hurricanes Debby, Helene, Milton regain full local control over growth and development decisions," Abbott posted week on Facebook. "It protects communities

that were not impacted by Hurricanes Debby, Helene, or Milton from unnecessary restrictions so they can keep moving forward."

The proposal would exempt from SB 180 most of the Panhandle of Tallahassee, excluding the coastal Gulf and Franklin counties; Nassau County in the northeast corner of the state; and Monroe and Miami-Dade counties in South Florida.

The 2026 session will begin Jan. 13.



Turning back from the brink of nuclear war

Early this year, legislators in the U.S. House of Representatives and in the U.S. Senate introduced resolutions that call upon the U.S. government to lead a global effort to halt and reverse the nuclear arms race. Co-sponsored by 36 members of the House and five members of the Senate, H. Res. 317 and S. Res. 323 urge the U.S. government to pursue nuclear disarmament, renounce the first use of nuclear weapons, end sole presidential authority to launch them, cancel plans for new, enhanced nuclear weapons and delivery systems, maintain the current moratorium nuclear testing explosions, and provide a just economic for impacted transition communities.

The context for these antinuclear measures is an weapons buildup has been

escalating nuclear arms race that is rapidly spiraling out of control. In recent years, Russia and the United States, which together possess 87 percent of the world's nuclear weapons, have scrapped nearly all their nuclear arms control agreements. The only exception is the New Start Treaty, which is scheduled to expire in February 2026. Meanwhile, all nine nuclear powers (Russia, United States, Britain, France, China, Israel, India, Pakistan, and North Korea) have committed themselves to dramatically upgrading their nuclear arsenals. The U.S. government, for example, at the enormous cost of \$1.7 trillion, is currently engaged in revamping its entire nuclear weapons complex and building an array of new, more devastating nuclear weapons.

This worldwide nuclear

accompanied by a revival of free of nuclear weapons. public threats by the leaders of nuclear-armed nations to initiate nuclear war?threats that have been issued, repeatedly, by Donald Trump, Kim Jong Un, and Vladimir Putin. Not surprisingly, the Doomsday Clock of the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists currently stands at 89 seconds to midnight, the most dangerous setting in its history.

The House and Senate resolutions seeking to halt and reverse this race toward catastrophe are primarily the product of the Back from the Brink campaign. Founded in 2017 by the leaders of two U.S. national organizations, Physicians for Social Responsibility and the Union of Concerned Scientists, Back from the Brink has emerged as an impressive coalition of organizations, individuals, and public officials working together to create a world

At this point, the Back from the Brink campaign has secured the endorsement of a significant number additional national organizations, including peace and disarmament groups like the American Friends Service Committee, the Federation of American Scientists, Pax Christi USA, Peace Action, and Veterans for Peace, religious organizations like the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterian Church, the Unitarian Universalist Association, and United Church of Christ, environmental like 350.org, the Natural Resources Defense Council, and the Sierra Club, political activist groups like the Hip Hop Caucus and Indivisible, governmental organizations like the United States Conference of Mayors.

never made us quit. My house was completely different. My mother would have us in bed before the sun went down and there was to be no noise coming from our room. We hid flashlights under the covers and spent hours communicating by making letters and words with our fingers.

In hindsight I often wonder why my friend would want to stay with me, but she did. We alternated homes almost every

other night and I can only remember one time we had a quarrel. I have no recollection of what it was about but she packed up and went home. It didn't last and we were soon inseparable again.

Her family went to church all the time. Mine did not. My friend rang the church bell. I helped her. I went to Sunday school, church, choir practice, Prayer meetings, revivals, daily vacation Bible School, and eventually church camp with her. My mother came to church whenmy friend and I were performing there, cheering us on. .She never missed anything we did.

Somehow it all worked.

My mother would send me to school with pigtails which I hated. My friend's mother would take them out and give me curls on the way to school and do the reverse when we stopped there on the way home. Looking back this now seems deceitful but truly this was two good mothers

who were very opposite in approach but always wanted the best for us girls and we turned out fine. My mother instilled discipline, following the

rules, common sense, being

a good citizen in us always

encouraging our friendship, but monitoring our behavior.

In junior high I was #1 in

our class, and my friend was #2. In senior high, my friend

#1 and I was #2. We shared everything.

Growing up we always played school, or hospital. She wanted to be a teacher, and I

I wanted to be a nurse. We both did just that and I got to do both.

As life has gone on, I have made many other friends, who I love and cherish. I wouldn't downgrade them for the world. They are what make me happy on a daily basis, but there is something about that first best friend that can never be duplicated. They are part of you with memories that cannot ever be erased, and as much of who you are as any strictly inherited traits.

I was blessed.

I love you, Lenna Beth, and I love your family for their part in my upbringing.

A few days later, she stopped by my desk, laughing. She said she drove the car home, parked it in her yard and the motor fell out!

When her son checked it out, he discovered the motor mount was missing a couple of bolts. For months, as the motor tried

desperately to break free, breakdowns. I drove it all that time, completely unaware.

It could've fallen out on I-75 in 70-mph traffic!

Ignorance may be bliss, but it's also dangerous. Likewise, a false sense of security is just that —

Lately, when I watch the news, everything in me wants to hide in ignorance. What I don't know can't hurt me, right? I tell myself, Everything is fine. Just ignore the noise — and those "Everything is not fine" nudgings.

Not just what's going on in the world — the wars, rumors of war, bitter political divisions and unrest — but also what's going on inside me when my bolts become loose.

Just the other day, my coworker Sarah and I were talking about how we sometimes don't want to "bother" God with our small needs, and how that really reveals an attitude of pride.

The writer of Proverbs didn't pull any punches: "The complacency of destroys them" fools (Proverbs 1:32).

With my Tempo, the car started every day, the wheels turned, the radio and A/C worked — so how bad could the noise be? Turns out, pretty bad.Neglect, complacency, and willful ignorance always seem harmless—until they aren't. Thankfully, God sends warnings—through his Word and through his Spirit living in us. And sometimes, he shows mercy and prevents a disaster from happening.

we ever do.


Furthermore, we're never without His love, compassion, grace, mercy and power.



brighter. Unlike the Republican Party recent decades, Democratic Party has championed a variety of nuclear arms control and disarmament measures. Thus, if the Democrats do well in the 2026 midterm elections and, thereby, retake control of the House and the Senate, there is a reasonable chance that they will pass Back from the Brink's antinuclear resolutions. Also, if the Democrats hold on to Congress and win the presidency in 2028, it's quite possible that nuclear arms control and disarmament will appear once again on the U.S. government's public policy agenda.

Of course, even if there are public policy advances along these lines, as there have been in the past, it will not end the immense danger of worldwide nuclear annihilation-a

with startling clarity in 1945 with the advent and use of nuclear weapons to obliterate two Japanese cities. Ultimately, a secure future for civilization will be attained only when these weapons of mass destruction abolished.

Is that feasible?


It's certainly possibility. After all, when directly confronted with the issue of human survival, most people have displayed appropriate concern for it by demanding an end to the nuclear menace. And that goal could be attained by seeing to it that all nations sign and ratify the Treaty the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. That landmark treaty, which was hammered out painstakingly at the United Nations in 2017 and which entered into force in 2021, has already been signed by 95 countries (a majority of the world's nations)

Admittedly, the nine nuclear powers, still clinging doggedly to their nuclear weapons, are not among them. But, if there mobilization public substantial pressure development international security guarantees enforced by a strengthened United Nations, the reluctance of these holdouts could be overcome and a nuclear weapons-free world established.

Meanwhile, to provide us with the time it will take to get to this state of affairs, we do need to focus on turning back from the brink of nuclear war.
